

WENT ON CRUTCHES TO SILVER WEDDING

Samuel Kleinman's Grit After Auto Mishap Admired by Friends.

WOULDN'T PUT OFF AFFAIR.

Made Good Promise as He Lay in Hospital.

Supported on crutches beside his wife, Samuel Kleinman, a prosperous Eastern District business man, and Mrs. Kleinman were remarried last night, at the Willoughby Mansion, 667 Willoughby avenue, in the presence of several hundred friends. The occasion was their fifth wedding anniversary. Rabbi Shielsky, of Manhattan, officiated. The "bridegroom" was compelled to use crutches, due to an automobile accident in which he was seriously injured a month ago.

When it was learned that Mr. Kleinman's condition was such that he would be in the hospital for some time, his friends urged him to call off the preparations for the affair. This he declined to do, saying Mrs. Kleinman would have the celebration held and his remarriage performed if he had to go to the hospital. He made good his promise.

At the close of the ceremony the guests retired to the dining room, where a banquet was spread. It was followed by a reception and dance. The "newlyweds" received many costly gifts and sashes of letters and telegrams of congratulations and best wishes.

Wyona Street Congregation Gives Them Banquet and Reception.

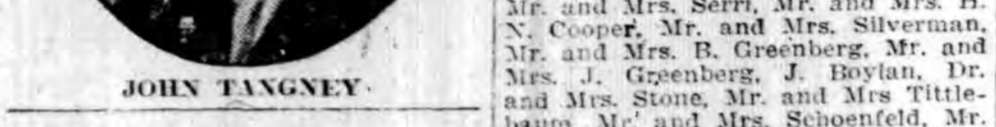
PURIM ALSO IS OBSERVED. Money is Contributed for New Edifice at Affair.
