An insight into gender-based violence in PNG and sport as a vehicle for behaviour change.



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Papua New Guinea is the only country in the world with Rugby League as the national sport. Despite its popularity, it is underutilised as a vehicle for development.

GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA

- An estimated 67% of women have been beaten by their husbands.¹
- The most common forms of physical violence include: kicking, punching, burning, and cutting with knives. These account for 80-90% of the injuries to women treated by health workers.²
- PNG has one of the world's highest rates of sexual violence, with an estimated 55% of women having experienced forced sex – in most cases by men known to them.³
- Medecins Sans Frontiers described the rates of sexual violence in PNG as a "humanitarian crisis".⁴
- Approximately 50% of married women have been beaten by their husbands to force them into sex.
- Through interviews, the PNG Medical Research Institute found that approximately 60% of men had engaged in gang rape.⁵
- Nearly half of reported rape victims are under 15 years of age and 13% are under age 7.6

SPORT AS A VEHICLE FOR BEHAVIOUR CHANGE

- The national strategy has identified men and boys as key agents in combating rates of gender-based violence.⁷
- Australian initiatives utilising Rugby League as a tool of behaviour change have successfully reduced reported rates of domestic violence by up to two thirds.⁸
- Crucially, outside RLAV, there are no significant strategies engaging men as vehicles of positive change within PNG.

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
