SENATE BILL NO. 17-65

AN ACT

To rename the Rota International Airport the "Benjamin Taisacan Manglona International Airport" in recognition of his services to the island and people of Rota and contributions to the Commonwealth; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE SEVENTEENTH NORTHERN MARIANAS COMMONWEALTH LEGISLATURE:

Section 1. <u>Findings</u>. The Legislature finds that the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona served the community of Rota as an engineer, clerk, public works officer, a representative, a delegate, a senator, and a mayor. He also worked in the private sector as a station manager for Continental Air Micronesia. The Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona provided valuable services, not only to the people of Rota, but to the entire Mariana Islands. He served as the third lieutenant governor of the Northern Mariana Islands.

The Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona received his primary education in Rota from 1947 through 1951 prior to relocating to Cathedral Grade School in Agana, Guam. In 1954-1957, he attended the Pacific Islands Central School (PICS) in Truk, Caroline Islands. In 1957, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona furthered his education in the Survey and Mapping School for several months in Palau. In 1964-1965, he took correspondence courses at the International Correspondence School (ICS) in Scranton, Pennsylvania. In 1966-1967, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona attended Honolulu Community College in Honolulu, Hawaii majoring in the field of Engineering Technology. In 1971-1973, he attended the University of Guam where he obtained an Associate of Science degree

in Civil Engineering Technology and completed the Construction Inspector Training at OICC in Guam.

The Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona worked from 1957 through 1968 for the Rota District Administration as a junior engineering aide, a senior engineering aide, supervising engineer, assistant surveyor, and cartographic engineer. From 1962-66, he worked part-time as the assistant clerk of court for Rota. He also served as the station manager for Air Micronesia in Rota from 1968-1969. The Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona subsequently served as a public works officer from 1970-1975.

The Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona is a great leader and a great public servant who served his people for nearly fifty years in various capacities, beginning in 1963-1965 as a member of the Marianas District Legislature, as a representative to the Congress of Micronesia in 1965-1970, and a member of the Marianas Political Status Commission from Rota in 1972.

Through his leadership and diligence as First Vice President of the First Constitutional Convention of 1976, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona participated in the drafting of the Commonwealth's Constitution which was ratified by the people of the Northern Mariana Islands and later, approved by the President of the United States of America.

The success of the newly established government of the Northern Mariana Islands was partly due to the exceptional abilities of its first elected officials, among them, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona, who served as senator in the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, and Sixth Northern Marianas Commonwealth Legislatures from 1977-1989. As a senator, he served as President of the Senate, Vice President of the Senate, and Chairman of the Committee on Fiscal Affairs.

As a Senator from the First Senatorial District, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona worked closely with then Senators Joseph S. Inos and Julian S. Calvo, and Representative Misael H. Ogo to obtain the capital improvement project funding for the construction of the Rota International Airport in the early 1980's. The Honorable Benjamin

Taisacan Manglona's hard work and diligence in securing funds paved the way for the grand opening of the Rota International Airport.

The Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona's public service career reached its pinnacle when he was elected as the Commonwealth's third Lieutenant Governor, along with his running mate the late Governor Lorenzo I. Guerrero, from 1990 through 1994. As Lieutenant Governor, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona helped stir the Commonwealth into a time of great prosperity and wealth in the government as well as the private sector.

The Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona's untiring commitment to public service led to his election as the Mayor of Rota for two terms from 1998-2006. Through his effective leadership and management, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona's administration greatly improved the quality and delivery of public services for the island of Rota.

Throughout his public service and private sector career, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona could always find comfort and encouragement in the unwavering support of his family, including his wife Maria Rosario Manglona, his deceased first wife Magdalena Mendiola Manglona, and children Lillian, Rebecca, Theodore, Marie, Joann, Benjamin Jr., Harold, Debra, Selina, Maximo, Francisco, Franny, and Fresca Bree.

Reflecting on the Commonwealth and Rota's economic, social, and political triumphs and struggles over the past 50 years, the Honorable Benjamin Taisacan Manglona looms prominently among the Commonwealth's great leaders. Because of his public service, dedication and contributions to the development and advancement of the Commonwealth and especially the island and people of Rota, the Legislature finds that it is appropriate to rename the Rota International Airport located in Sinapalo Village, Rota, the "Benjamin Taisacan Manglona International Airport" in his honor.

Section 2. <u>Amendment</u>. Title 1, Chapter 4, Article 3 of the Commonwealth Code is amended by adding a new section 437 to read as follows:

"§ 437. Rota: International Airport.

- (a) The Rota International Airport located in Sinapalo Village, Rota is hereby renamed as the "Benjamin Taisacan Manglona International Airport" in recognition and appreciation of his untiring and outstanding public service, dedication, and contributions to the island and people of Rota, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.
- (b) The Mayor of Rota, in coordination with the Commonwealth Ports Authority, shall prepare a plan of dedication within sixty days from the effective date of this Act."
- **Section 3.** <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Act or the application of any such provision to any person or circumstance should be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this Act or the application of its provisions to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby.
- Section 4. Savings Clause. This Act and any repealer contained herein shall not be construed as affecting any existing right acquired under contract or acquired under statutes repealed or under any rule, regulation or order adopted under the statutes. Repealers contained in this Act shall not affect any proceeding instituted under or pursuant to prior law. The enactment of this Act shall not have the effect of terminating, or in any way modifying, any liability civil or criminal, which shall already be in existence at the date this Act becomes effective.
- **Section 5.** <u>Effective Date</u>. This Act shall take effect upon its approval by the Governor or upon its becoming law without such approval.
