During the day there were bombs reported by anonymous phone callers at the Cornish Arms hotel, a 43-story building on Maiden lane, the Western Electric Company and 205 East 45th street bid searches following evacuation of workers turned up nothing. The United Nations headquarters area was searched twice for bombs, but none was found.

The New York Times and United Press International received unsigned special delivery letters early yesterday which said:
"During this week of anti-war protest, we set off

exploives in the offices of Chase Manhattan, Standard Oil and General Motors. Guards at all three buildings and a group of about 100 in the city were telephoned 30 to 60 minutes in advance to insure that the buildings would be clear of people.
"The Vietnam war is only the most obvious evidence of the way this country's power destroys people.
"The giant corporations of America have now spread the globe and are forcing the world, forcing entire foreign economies into total dependence on American money and power.
"Here at home these same corporations have made us into insane consumers, devouring increasing quantities of useless cars, radios and household appliances. We work at mindless jobs. Vast machines pollute our air, water and food.
"Spurred Agnew may be a household word, but it is the rarely seen men like David Rockefeller of Chase Manhattan, James Roche of General Motors and Michael Haider of Standard Oil who run the system behind the scenes.
"The empire is breaking down as peoples all over the globe are rising up to challenge its power. From the inside, black people have been fighting a revolution for years.
"Finally, from the heart of the empire, white Americans too are striking blows for liberation."
CALLS
Rockefeller is chairman of Chase Manhattan and member of the family which founded Standard Oil. Roche is chairman of GM and Haider retired as chairman of Standard Oil six weeks ago.

have forwarded copies of the cryptogram to a number of people, and expect it to be deciphered within a few days.
They, too, feel that the new victims' names, or some other expected list, regarding a specific double-murder or pair of separate murders, may be hidden somewhere in the Zodiac puts down on paper.
At the moment, the few tenuous links between the murders of the two San Jose girls and Zodiac are:
Zodiac hints the two just-disclosed murders occurred in August.
Deborah Gaj Furlong, 14, and Kathleen Smoot, 15, were slain last August 5.
Zodiac used a long, thin-bladed knife in his attack at Lake Berryessa, reportedly stabbing a young girl (who died two days later) and her companion.
The bodies of the two San Jose girls bore some 150 knife wounds each—from a long, thin-bladed knife.
Zodiac's letter contained five cross marks which possibly refer to five attacks. Comparing these markings against a map, one interpretation that can be drawn is that they pinpoint Lake Berryessa (where two attacks occurred), San Francisco and San Jose.
The girls were murdered in San Jose.
Zodiac intends to strike on weekends, And, in the Lake Berryessa stabbings, the surviving victim was drawn by a dog.
August 5 was a Sunday and the attack occurred before dusk.
Despite the circumstantial evidence, the police officer in charge of the San Jose investigation does not think Zodiac is the killer of the girls.

Compromise On March In Capital

March committee said the group is satisfied with the new route.
The compromise followed several days of virtually continuous negotiations with sponsors of the march.
It provides for the procession to begin at the traditional parade avenue from the Capitol as far as 15th Street and from there to the grounds of the Washington Monument for a rally climaxing three days of anti-war activities.
Identifiers and Washington also said the government agreed to the route after the New Mobilization promised to provide enough parade marshals to ensure order during the march, which is expected to attract about 20,000 people and be the biggest anti-war protest in history.

Mayor Washington added in a separate statement that "we have every expectation that this weekend will again demonstrate the city's right to be known as the capital of a free and responsible men."
Under terms of the agreement the committee will send the 8000 parade marshals to keep demonstrators from the south side of Pennsylvania Avenue and another 5000 marshals to keep crowds from the other side of the thoroughfare.
Meanwhile, a small advance party of the 82nd Airborne Division is here from Ft. Bragg, N.C., to prepare for possible movement of paratroopers to the capital in connection with the week-end demonstrations.
BRIGADE
Pentagon officials said no final decision has been made but they indicated a light brigade of between 1500 and 2000 paratroopers may be brought up before the week-end.
The Defense Department called it "a normal part of the precautionary measures we have been asked to take by the Justice Department."
Any such units brought into the capital area would be stationed on Federal property which would be used in a peacekeeping role after a presidential proclamation of emergency, authorities said.
However, Federal troops could be used to guard Federal buildings without such a formal proclamation.

open a dialogue with the Communist Chinese.
The humdrum debate brought no surprises, except perhaps for the fact that the Soviet Union, which last year gave only perfunctory endorsement to Peking, did not speak this year at all. It never has been voted for admission.
Among the most significant changes were the switches by Belgium, Chile and Haiti from opposition to abstention, although none favored the expulsion of Taiwan.
Four Afro-Asian countries—Chana, Libya, Mauritius and Nigeria—switched from abstention to votes in favor of seating Peking and expelling Nationalist China. Senegal moved from abstention to opposition.
On the "important question" of resolution 1585, changed from "yes" to "no," reflecting the more militant stance of the new Arab republic, Ecuador, which had abstained last year, voted in favor this time.
Malaysia changed from "yes" to abstention and Kuwait from "no" to abstention.

comprehensive review of the draft laws. His committee is expected to report on the bill but only with assurances that reformers will not try to load it up with amendments.
Senators led reporters after the meeting that he had promised broad hearings next year and would make "every reasonable effort" to get a reform bill to the Senate.
Kennedy joined Stennis at press conference and agreed that it would be better to give reform proposals careful consideration rather than write the bill on the floor. He said the pledge from Stennis and Senator Margaret Chase Smith (Rep-Me.), senior Republican on the Armed Services Committee, "Gives the war."
