

## TOKYO 2020 OLYMPIC TENNIS EVENT

## Tournament Preview

Tennis is featuring at the Summer Olympic Games for the 16th time as a full-medal sport. The sport was part of the inaugural Summer Olympics in 1896 and remained on the programme until 1924. It returned as a full-medal sport at Seoul 1988 (after being played as a demonstration event in both 1968 and 1984). Since then, the men's and women's singles and men's and women's doubles have been played at every Olympic Tennis Event, with the mixed doubles returning at London 2012.

Great Britain's Charlotte Cooper became the first individual woman to win a gold medal in any Olympic sport when she won the women's tennis singles at Paris 1900.

The Olympic Tennis Event is taking place on outdoor hard courts for the 7th time. The Centre Court at the Ariake Tennis Park has a retractable roof - marking the 2nd time since tennis returned to the Olympics in 1988 that matches can be played indoors. Two matches were played under a roof at London 2012, when the event was held at Wimbledon.

The 2020 Summer Olympics were postponed by one year due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The Olympic Tennis Event was originally due to take place from 25 July to 2 August 2020.

Extreme weather: The Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event will implement an Extreme Weather Policy, with Wet Bulb Globe Temperature (WBGT) measurements will be taken daily, every half hour, beginning at approximately 10:00am. WBGT measurements of $30.1^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ or higher could lead to modification of play for men's and women's singles matches, or the suspension of play for all matches. ## DJOKOVIC AND BARTY AIM TO CONTINUE MOMENTUM

Novak Djokovic and Ashleigh Barty are both bidding to add an Olympic gold medal to the Wimbledon singles titles the pair won earlier in July.

Djokovic is making his 4th appearance at the Olympics, with his best result coming at Beijing 2008, when he defeated James Blake to win the bronze medal in the men's singles. He enters an Olympic Games as the world No. 1 for the 2nd time, having also arrived at Rio 2016 as the No. 1-ranked player.

Barty is making her Olympic debut this year and is bidding to become the first Australian woman to win a gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event. Victory for Barty would be Australia's 2nd gold medal in tennis - after Todd Woodbridge and Mark Woodforde won men's doubles gold at Atlanta 1996.

## THE GOLDEN SLAM

Having also won the men's singles titles at the Australian Open and Roland Garros, Djokovic is bidding to become the 2nd player in history to win the 'Golden Slam' - comprising the singles titles at all 4 Grand Slam events and the Olympic gold medal in singles in the same year. Steffi Graf is the only player to have achieved the feat, having won the gold medal at Seoul 1988 and all 4 Grand Slam singles titles the same year.

Djokovic is also bidding to become the 5th player to win all 4 Grand Slam singles titles and an Olympic gold medal in singles during his career (ie not necessarily during a calendar year) - after Graf, Andre Agassi, Rafael Nadal and Serena Williams.

Three doubles teams have also won the 'career Golden Slam' - Todd Woodbridge/Mark Woodforde and Bob Bryan/Mike Bryan in men's doubles, and Serena Williams/Venus Williams in women's doubles.

Pierre-Hugues Herbert/Nicolas Mahut are the only doubles team competing at Tokyo 2020 who could win a 'career Golden Slam' in doubles - the French pair have won 5 Grand Slam men's doubles titles together, including at Roland Garros this year.

## WORLD NO. 1s AT THE OLYMPICS

Djokovic would become the first male world No. 1 player to win an Olympic gold medal since tennis returned to the Olympics in 1988. The highest-ranked male players to have won gold since then are No. 2 Nadal at Beijing 2008 and No. 2 Andy Murray at Rio 2016.

Barty would become the 3rd No. 1-ranked player to win the women's singles gold medal at the Olympics - after Graf at Seoul 1988 and Justine Henin at Athens 2004.

At Rio 2016, the top-seeded player/team lost in the 1st round in 4 of the 5 singles and doubles events. Serena Williams, who was No. 1 seed in the women's singles, was the only top seed to progress beyond the 1st round - she reached the 3rd round before falling to Elina Svitolina.

## OSAKA AIMS FOR TOKYO TRIUMPH

Four-time Grand Slam champion Naomi Osaka leads the Japanese players aiming to win gold on home soil at the Olympic Tennis Event this year.

Since tennis' return to the Olympics in 1988, just 3 players have won singles gold on home soil - Andre Agassi and Lindsay Davenport, who both won gold at Atlanta 1966, and Murray, who won his first Olympic gold at London 2012.

## JAPANESE CONTENDERS

At Rio 2016, Kei Nishikori became the first Japanese player to win a medal at the Olympic Tennis Event since tennis returned to the Games in 1988 - he fell to Murray in the men's singles semifinals before defeating Nadal in the bronze medal match. Nishikori is one of 4 Japanese men competing at the Olympic Tennis Event this year.

Should Osaka, Nishikori or any of the other Japanese players win the title here, it would be the first time in history that Japan has won a gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event.

## MURRAY DEFENDS

Murray became the first player to successfully defend an Olympic singles title by winning gold at Rio 2016, where he defeated Argentina's Juan Martin del Potro in the final. He had previously won the men's singles title at London 2012, defeating Switzerland's Roger Federer in the gold medal match. Murray also won the silver medal in mixed doubles at London 2012 - he and Laura Robson fell to Belarus' Victoria Azarenka/Max Mirnyi in the final.

The Rio 2016 women's singles gold medallist, Monica Puig, is not competing at Tokyo 2020, but 2 other gold medallists from Rio will compete here this year - Elena Vesnina (who won the women's doubles gold medal alongside Ekaterina Makarova at Rio 2016) will compete in women's singles and women's doubles, alongside Veronika Kudermetova, here; and Bethanie Mattek-Sands (who won the mixed doubles gold medal alongside Jack Sock at Rio 2016) will compete in women's doubles alongside Jessica Pegula here.

## MOST OLYMPIC MEDALS IN TENNIS

Murray is bidding to become the 4th man - and the first since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988 to win 4 Olympic medals in tennis. As well as defending his men's singles title, Murray will compete in men's doubles here alongside Joe Salisbury.

Murray is bidding to become the 4th player in history, man or woman, to win 3 or more Olympic gold medals in tennis - after Venus Williams and Serena Williams (who have won 4 gold medals each) and Reginald Doherty (who won 3 gold medals).

Murray is also bidding to become the 4th player in history (and first man) to win a medal at 3 different Olympic games.

## OLYMPIC MEDALLISTS IN THE FIELD

Seven former Olympic medallists are competing in Tokyo - Andy Murray is the only player competing here to have won multiple Olympic medals. There are 2 other former gold medallists competing here - Rio 2016 women's doubles champion Elena Vesnina and Rio 2016 mixed doubles champion Bethanie Mattek-Sands.

## WINNING SINGLES AND DOUBLES TITLES

Since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988, just 3 players have won the singles and doubles titles at the same Olympic Tennis Event - Venus Williams (Sydney 2000), Nicolas Massu (Athens 2004) and Serena Williams (London 2012). No player has ever won gold in singles, doubles and mixed doubles at the same Olympic Tennis Event. (see table overleaf)

## WINNING SINGLES, DOUBLES AND MIXED MEDALS

No player in the modern era has won medals in singles, doubles and mixed doubles at the same Olympic Tennis Event. Seven players achieved the feat between 1900 and 1924. (NB Mixed doubles was reintroduced at the Olympic Tennis Event at London 2012)

## GRAND SLAM CHAMPIONS BID FOR OLYMPIC GOLD

A total of 11 Grand Slam singles champions are competing at Tokyo 2020 - including all 4 players who have won Grand Slam singles titles in 2021. Novak Djokovic has won all 3 Grand Slam men's singles titles this year, while the 3 Grand Slam women's singles titles have been won by Naomi Osaka (Australian Open), Barbora Krejcikova (Roland Garros) and Ashleigh Barty (Wimbledon).

## OLYMPIC DEBUTANTS

In the women's singles draw, 5 of the Top 8 seeds are making their Olympic debut - Ashleigh Barty, Naomi Osaka, Aryna Sabalenka, Iga Swiatek and Barbora Krejcikova. Only Elina Svitolina, Karolina Pliskova and Garbine Muguruza have competed before.

In the men's singles draw, 7 of the Top 8 seeds are making their Olympic debuts at Tokyo 2020 - of the 8 players, No. 1 seed Djokovic is the only player to have competed at the Olympics, with Daniil Medvedev, Stefanos Tsitsipas, Alexander Zverev, Andrey Rublev, Pablo Carreno Busta, Hubert Hurkacz and Diego Schwartzman all competing at the Olympic Tennis Event for the first time.

## MOST OLYMPIC APPEARANCES

Leander Paes holds the record for most Olympic appearances, having played at 7 consecutive Olympic Tennis Events between 1992 and 2016. Chinese Taipei's Yen-Hsun Lu is competing at his 5th Olympic Tennis Event, equalling Mahesh Bhupathi, Mark Knowles and Max Mirnyi in 3rd place on the list for most Olympics contested by a male tennis player. A further 7 men are contesting their 4th Olympic Tennis Event at Tokyo 2020 - of the 7 players, 5 are competing in singles for the 4th time (Marin Cilic, Novak Djokovic, Andy Murray, Kei Nishikori and Gilles Simon).

Arantxa Sanchez Vicario and Venus Williams hold the record for most Olympic appearances among female players, having played at 5 Olympic Tennis Events each - and by making her 5th Olympic appearance here, Samantha Stosur has equalled the record. Four women are contesting their 4th Olympic Tennis Event at Tokyo 2020 - of the 4 players, 2 are competing in singles for the 4th time (Alize Cornet and Carla Suarez Navarro). (NB Petra Kvitova competed in women's doubles only at Beijing 2008)

## YOUTH OLYMPIANS GRADUATE TO THE BIG TIME

A total of 17 players ( 6 men, 11 women) who competed at one of the 3 Youth Olympic Games are competing at Tokyo 2020.

Seven of the 17 former Youth Olympians competing here won medals at the Youth Olympic Games, with Poland's Kamil Majchrzak and Iga Swiatek, and China P.R.’s Zheng Saisai the only former Youth Olympic gold medallists at Tokyo 2020. No tennis player has yet won medals at both a Youth Olympic Games and an Olympic Games. (see table overleaf)

## YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The oldest player competing at the Olympic Tennis Event this year is Austria's Oliver Marach (41 years 16 days), who is competing in men's doubles alongside Philipp Oswald. The youngest player here is Canada's Leylah Fernandez (18 years 329 days), who is competing in women's singles.

Barcelona 1992 women's singles champion Jennifer Capriati is the youngest player in history to win a gold medal at the Olympic Tennis Event. The youngest man in history to win gold is Friedrich Traun in men's doubles at Athens 1896 and the youngest man in the modern era to win gold is Marc Rosset (21 years 275 days) in men's singles at Barecelona 1992.

The oldest players to win gold medals in all 5 events all competed at Olympic Games prior to 1924. In the modern era, the oldest man to win gold is Max Mirnyi (35 years 31 days) in mixed doubles at London 2012 and the oldest woman to win gold is Gigi Fernandez (32 years 163 days) in women's doubles at Atlanta 1996.

## ALL-TIME MEDAL TABLE

USA top the all-time Olympic Tennis Event medal table with 21 gold medals won in tennis. Great Britain have won the highest-number of medals overall, with 43 Olympic medals won in tennis in total.

## MODERN-ERA MEDAL TABLE

USA also tops the modern-era Olympic Tennis Event medal table. Since tennis returned to the Olympics at Seoul 1988, American singles players and doubles teams have won 14 of the 34 available gold medals. USA have also won the most total medals of any nation at the Olympic Tennis Event since 1988, with 24 Olympic medals in tennis in total in that time.

## COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

A total of 191 players from 46 nations are represented at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Tennis Event. Mixed doubles entries will be decided from players on site after the sign-in deadline on Tuesday 27 July. Of the 46 nations, 27 have won at least one medal at the Olympic Tennis Event in history prior to this year - and 22 have won at least one medal at the Olympic Tennis Event since Seoul 1988. Egyptian players are competing at the Olympic Tennis Event for the first time.
