

# Hoods Run Out of Area--

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(from the Barbara home) within an hour.

A shuttle service of police cars was established and four men at a time were taken to the Vestal substation for questioning.

Sergeant Crosswell said all had just one story:

"Mr. Barbara had been sick, and we all came to see him. We just happened to drop in at the same time."

**5 FROM ENDICOTT AREA**

Police learned that in addition to those who had come from such far off places as California and Cuba, five Endicott area men were guests of Barbara.

They included:

**ANTHONY F. (GOV) GUARNIERI, 47**, who said he operates the Tri-Cities Dress Co., Inc., 172 1/2 Conklin Avenue.

In 1952, Guarnieri was called before a Broome County grand jury investigating the murder of James DeFelippo (Jimmy Flip).

He refused, however, to sign a waiver of immunity from possible prosecution in that case. Guarnieri told the grand jury that he would not testify on the grounds of possible self-incrimination.

**CONVICTED GAMBLER**

The same year Guarnieri halted his own trial in Broome County Court by pleading guilty to a charge of illegally having a pistol. He was sentenced to four months in jail.

Guarnieri is a convicted gambler. In 1948 he was fined \$1,500 after pleading guilty of operating a lottery. Sergeant Crosswell was one of the investigators in that case.

Others from the Endicott area are:

**PASQUALE (PATSY) TURRIGIANO, 51**, of 3015 Watson Boulevard, who pleaded guilty to a federal charge of illegal operation of a still, after a raid on a still in the town of Maine in February, 1949. He was sentenced to eight months in jail and fined \$700.

**IGNATIUS CANNON, 32**, of 8634 Rath Avenue, Endwell.

**BARTOLO GUCCIA, 66**, of 202 Oak Hill Avenue, Endicott.

**EMANUEL ZICARI, 57**, of 103 Squires Avenue, Endicott.

The reason for the meeting can only be speculated upon. But the thing that interests police is that the gathering was of sufficient high-level importance to bring such a kingpin figure as Genovese to Apalachin and to have two other men span the continent for the rendezvous.

**STRIPPED OF CITIZENSHIP**

Genovese has been described as the boss of the policy rackets. He came to the U. S., as did Barbara, from Italy, arriving here in 1913.

Genovese filed citizenship papers in 1936. Last year, a federal court in Philadelphia upheld an action of the government in stripping Genovese of his citizenship on the ground that he deliberately concealed a criminal record.

The government said Genovese had been arrested 10 times and

convicted twice of concealment of weapons.

Four years ago in an action for separate maintenance, his wife, Anna, testified that he had interests in rackets that included an Italian lottery and had holdings in racetracks and night clubs. She estimated his income at \$20,000 a week.

Genovese claimed at the time he had only a \$107-a-week income from a New York City scrap paper firm.

**CONNECTED WITH MAFIA**

The couple once lived in a home at Atlantic Highlands, N. J., that reputedly cost \$250,000. Police say Genovese now has sold the large house and lives in a small home there.

One of the men who came from California to attend the Apalachin meeting is said by the police of Los Angeles to have been connected with the criminal Mafia.

He is Simone Scozzari of San Gabriel, Cal. He told Sergeant Crosswell he was "unemployed."

In a pocket, he carried \$10,000 in cash, Sergeant Crosswell said. He is a Sicilian-born alien and a convict bookmaker.

Among the guests at Barbara's barbecue was a lawyer, Frank Desimone, 48, of Downey, Cal., Sergeant Crosswell said.

It took a trans-Caribbean flight to bring Louis Santos, 42, from Havana, Cuba, to Apalachin. Santos runs a Havana night club, called the Sans Souci.

**UNION OFFICIAL PRESENT**

Another guest, who had to come only a short distance, from Lewiston, is a union official.

He is James V. LaDuca, identified as secretary-treasurer of Local 66 of the Hotel and Restaurant Employees union.

Sergeant Crosswell said the two agents from the Alcohol Tax Unit were called in by state police because some of the Barbara guests had bootlegging records.

"We broke up the meeting because we were convinced it was being held for an unlawful purpose," the sergeant said.

When asked whether any of the men had resented being taken in for questioning, Sergeant Crosswell said:

"These guys are never indignant."

Last night, reporters—and they were calling from all over the east—kept asking Sergeant Crosswell whether he could have booked any of the men on charges of vagrancy.

**EXPLAINS THE LAW**

He said, no, because the provisions of the State Penal Code that apply to such places as Apalachin and Vestal, which are unincorporated, say that a man cannot be arrested for vagrancy unless he has lived there for six months.

In many such communities, these provisions are superseded by local ordinances.

The sergeant said that in this particular instance all he could do was "let them know they can't congregate, that they can't hang around here. Every time

they do, they'll be picked up and checked."

For the roundup, troopers were called in from substations at Horseheads, Five Mile Point, Waverly and the Main Troop C Barracks at Sidney.

Besides Sergeant Crosswell, there were two ranking state police officers—Lt. Joseph A. Murphy and Lt. Kenneth E. Weidenbourn—taking part.

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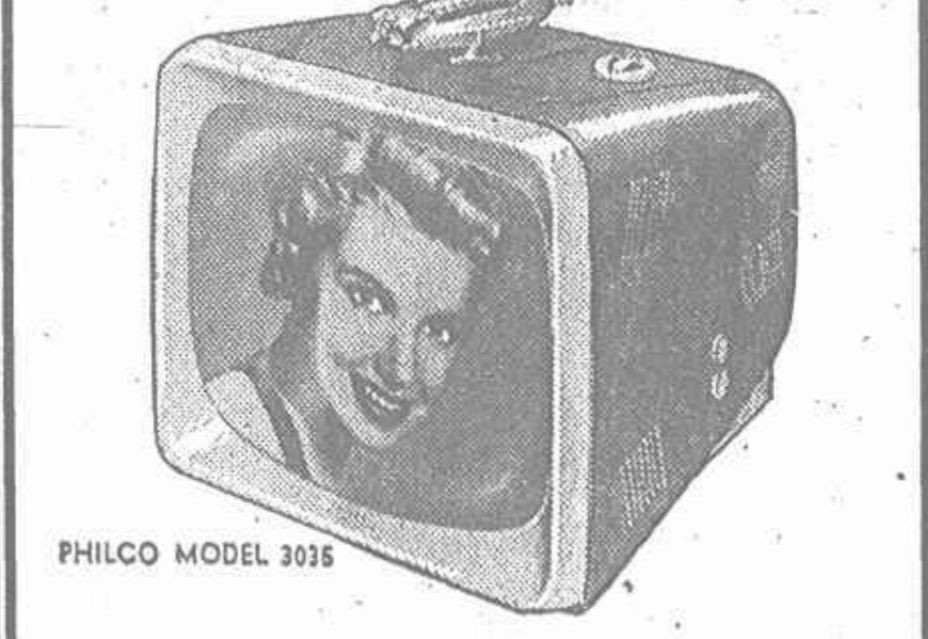
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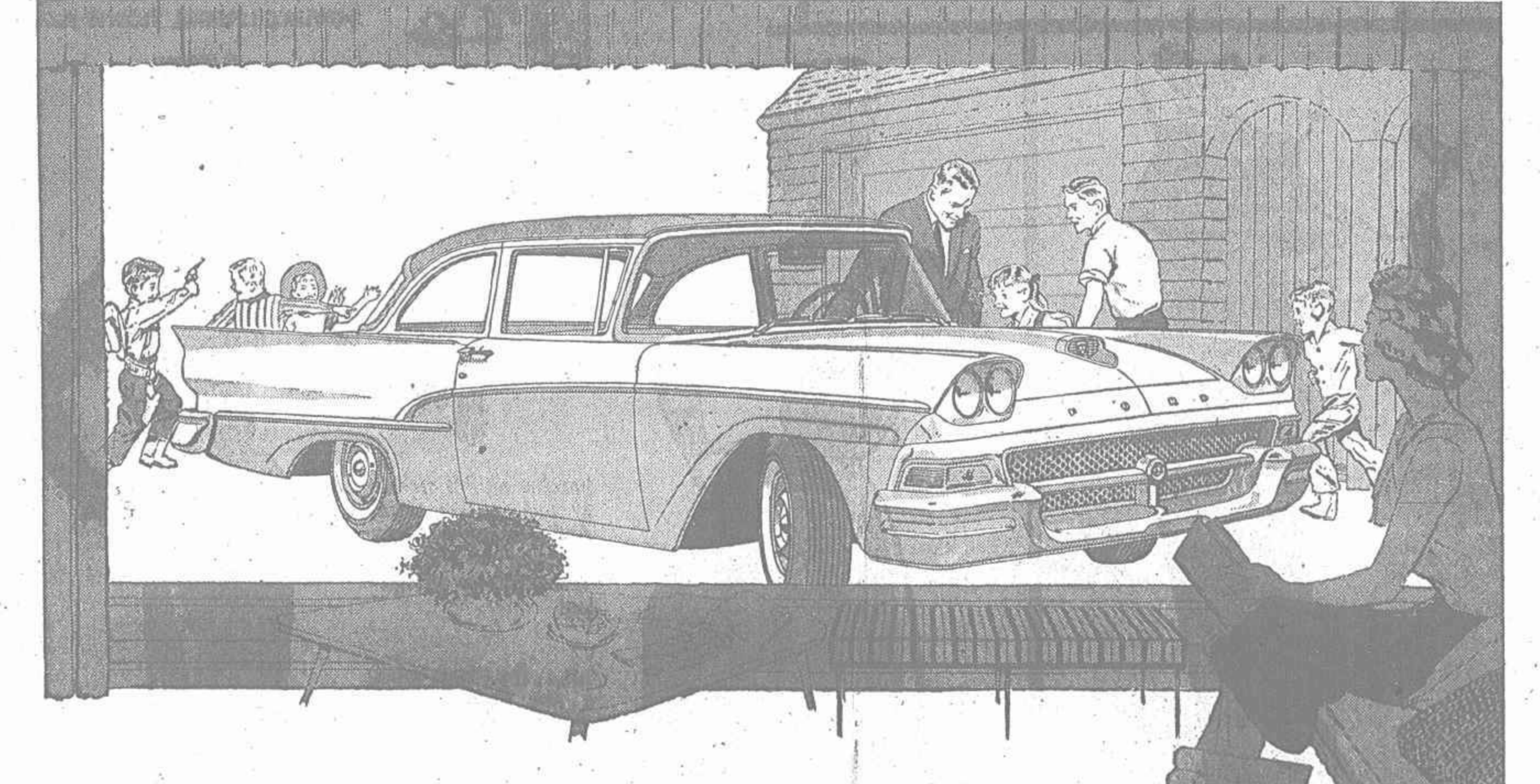
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
