Joe Lacob

Owner & CEO

In his role as Owner & CEO, Joe Lacob is the managing member of the Golden State Warriors' ownership group. Currently in his eighth year as Warriors owner, he serves on the NBA Board of Governors and is a member of the league's Competition Committee, Planning Committee and Labor Committee. In 2014-15, Lacob's fifth season as owner, the Warriors posted a then-franchise-record 67 wins during the regular season and captured the team's first NBA Championship in 40 years. This marked the first time in 20 years, since the Houston Rockets in 1994 & 1995, that an ownership group had captured an NBA title within


its first five years after taking control of the franchise. The championship campaign tipped off the most successful three-year run in NBA history, as the club amassed an NBA-record 207 regular-season victories from 2014-15 to 2016-17, including the most wins in a single season in NBA history (73) in 2015-16. The Warriors captured their second NBA Championship in three years in 2016-17, posting a 16-1 (.941) mark in the 2017 NBA Playoffs, the best single-season winning percentage in NBA postseason history. The Warriors have made five-straight playoff appearances for the first time since doing so in each of the NBA's first six seasons in existence from 1946-47 through 1951-52. In fact, prior to the last five seasons, the club had only made the playoffs once in the previous 18 years. The franchise's success in recent years has also extended to the business side. In 2014 and again in 2016, the Warriors were named "Sports Team of the Year" by the Sports Business Journal/Daily, in recognition of the organization's innovative and successful business practices. This marks the first time that any professional team has won this prestigious sports business award more than once. Additionally, under Lacob's guidance, the Golden State Warriors were named the 2016 winner of the Entrepreneurial Company of the Year (ENCORE) Award by the Stanford University Graduate School of Business in recognition of the organization's entrepreneurial spirit in redefining sports management, pioneering the use of sports analytics in the NBA, and adopting new technologies that have transformed the fan experience. The Warriors are the first sports organization to win the ENCORE Award, which has been presented annually since 1982 to recognize best in class entrepreneurial companies from around the world, including such recent winners as Google (2004), Apple (2005), and Amazon (2010). In addition to the Warriors organization-wide honors, Lacob was named the 2016 recipient of the Sports Executive of the Year award by the Sports Business Journal/Daily. He was also named one of the Bay Area's Most Admired CEO's by the San Francisco Business Times in November of 2015. Since making a then-record-setting bid to purchase his hometown NBA club – a longtime dream of the Atherton resident – and assuming control of the team on November 12, 2010, Lacob has been the driving force behind many of the creative changes that have transpired with the organization, including several major announcements, prominent personnel additions and an emphasis on transparency. Additionally, since its inception in 2012, the revamped Warriors Community Foundation has awarded nearly \$4 million in grants - one of the top figures in the NBA – to local school districts and non-profits serving at-risk and vulnerable students. In October 2015, the Warriors completed the purchase of 12 acres of land in San Francisco's Mission Bay neighborhood and, in January 2017, broke ground on Chase Center, the team's state-of-the-art sports and entertainment complex set to open in fall of 2019. In addition to making monumental commitments

to the team's future, Lacob has taken an active role in connecting the current Warriors organization with its rich history. In 2012, Lacob saw to it that one of the most beloved players in franchise history, Chris Mullin, received the honor of having his #17 jersey raised to the rafters at Oracle Arena, becoming the sixth player in franchise history to have his number retired. Lacob's NBA and professional sports experience dates back over two decades, including a five-year tenure as minority owner of the Boston Celtics, where he served on the basketball committee. He earned an NBA World Championship ring in 2008 with the storied franchise before selling his minority stake to purchase the Warriors. Lacob began his career at Menlo Park, California, based Kleiner Perkins Caufield & Byers in 1987. Though still a strategic advisor to the firm, he has relinquished his managing partner role in order to pursue his lifelong goal of owning and operating an NBA team. In his role as a venture capitalist, he has led investments in over 50 start-up companies across multiple fields in life sciences and medical technologies, the internet and energy. Lacob earned a Bachelor's in Biological Sciences from the University of California-Irvine, a Master's in Public Health (Epidemiology) from UCLA and an M.B.A. from the Stanford Graduate School of Business. He credits his Master's degree in Epidemiology (biostatistics) with providing him a background in statistics that helped drive his passion for sports.

Peter Guber

Owner

Peter Guber, a prominent figure in the entertainment industry for more than 30 years, is currently in his eighth season as owner of the Golden State Warriors. As co-managing partner, he and Joe Lacob were the driving forces behind the current ownership group's bid to purchase the Warriors in 2010. In 2015, the Warriors captured the organization's first NBA Championship in 40 years, beginning the most successful three-year run in NBA history that included an NBA-record 73 wins in 2015-16 and the club's second title in



three seasons in 2017. Additionally, the Warriors were named "Sports Team of the Year" by the Sports Business Journal/ Daily in 2014 and 2016 in recognition of the organization's innovative and successful business practices, becoming the first team to win the prestigious award more than once. Guber brings lifelong experience in sports and location-based entertainment, recognizing the importance of enhancing every aspect of fan experience. In May 2012, Guber joined Lacob, then-NBA Commissioner David Stern and San Francisco Mayor Edwin Lee in announcing the Warriors' intention to build a privately financed sports and entertainment venue in San Francisco. That vision took a giant leap forward in January 2017 when the Warriors broke ground on Chase Center, the team's state-of-the-art sports and entertainment complex in San Francisco's Mission Bay neighborhood, which is set to open in fall of 2019. One of the most successful executives and entrepreneurs in the entertainment and communications industries, Guber's impressive resume includes serving as the Chairman & CEO of Sony Pictures Entertainment, President of Columbia Pictures, Chairman and CEO of Polygram Entertainment and Co-Owner and Co-Chairman of Casablanca Record & Filmworks. Among the films he personally produced or executive produced are Rain Man (Academy Award – Best Picture), Batman, The Color Purple, Midnight Express, Gorillas in the Mist, The Witches of Eastwick, Missing and Flashdance. Guber's personal movies have earned more than \$3 billion worldwide, while also garnering more than 50 Academy Award nominations. Guber is the Founder and CEO of Mandalay Entertainment, a visionary multimedia venture spanning movies, TV, sports and digital media. Mandalay's feature films include Soul Surfer, The Kids Are All Right, Bernie, Donnie Brasco and Sleepy Hollow, among many others. Guber is Chairman of Mandalay Sports Media, a partnership with Mike Tollin, Emmy and Peabody Award-winning film and television producer/director, and CAA Sports, the world's leading athlete representation agency. Guber is a full professor at UCLA, teaching at the Anderson School of Management and the School of Theater, Film, Television and Digital Media. He is a member of the UCLA Foundation Board of Trustees, as well as the winner of UCLA's prestigious Service Award for his accomplishments in association with the school. Guber is the founding member of the Board of Advisors for the Center for Managing Enterprises in Media, Entertainment & Sports (MEMES) at the UCLA Anderson School of Management. Guber served as the co-host of the critically acclaimed television show, Shootout, for six years on American Movie Classics cable network. AMC moved Guber's talents to prime time with Story Makers, a series of one hour specials on the cable network. Guber was most recently seen on Starz/Encore as co-

host of In the House, a weekly news and interview show focusing on industry trends in pop culture. He can currently be seen as an Entertainment and Media Analyst on Fox Business News. A noted author, Guber's third book, Tell To Win – Connect, Persuade, and Triumph with the Hidden Power of Story, was published by Crown Business on March 1, 2011, and became an instant #1 New York Times bestseller. Fortune magazine chose Tell To Win as one of its "5 Business Books You Can Really Use" and Hudson Booksellers, retail book stores in airports throughout North America, chose Tell To Win as one of the "5 Best Business Books of the Year."s Tell to Win is in its 13th printing. Guber was recruited by Columbia Pictures out of NYU's Graduate School of Business, where he was pursuing an MBA. He holds a BA, Master of Law and Juris Doctorate degrees. He received his honorary doctorate in Fine Arts from the University of Connecticut; was named Albert Gallatin Fellow at New York University; is a recipient of Syracuse University's George Arents Pioneer Award, the highest honor that can be given to an alumnus, for his distinguished work in film; and is also a recipient of USC's Dean's Award for National Business Leadership.





Rick Welts

President & Chief Operating Officer

One of the most respected business executives in the NBA—with over 40 years of experience in the league—Rick Welts is currently in his seventh season as president and chief operating officer of the Golden State Warriors, reporting to the organization's Co-Managing Partners, Joe Lacob and Peter Guber. In this role, he oversees all business-related operations for the Warriors, including the development of the Chase Center, a privately financed sports and entertainment center in San Francisco's Mission Bay neighborhood that broke ground in January 2017. He owns the rare distinction of being part of championship

teams in the NBA (3), WNBA (2) and NBA G League (1). Under Welts' direction, the organization has established several franchise benchmarks from a business standpoint in recent years, as the Warriors brand continues to grow in stature following three consecutive NBA Finals appearances and a pair of NBA championships in 2014-15 and 2016-17. The organization has won numerous awards across all facets of the business in recent years, including the Warriors being named Sports Team of the Year across all sports in both 2014 and 2016 by the Sports Business Journal/Daily. The Warriors are the first professional team to win this coveted award twice. Welts, 64, owns an impressive and all-encompassing résumé that includes a myriad of different capacities spanning virtually every level of an NBA operation. Prior to joining the Warriors in October 2011, he spent nine years as president of the Phoenix Suns. Welts'responsibilities in Phoenix included the supervision of all business operations for the Suns, while also overseeing the team's interest in the management of the US Airways Center and the WNBA's Phoenix Mercury. Prior to joining the Suns, Welts enjoyed a successful 17-year (1982-1999) stint at the NBA league office in New York, where he ascended through the ranks to eventually become the league's third-in-command as the executive vice president, chief marketing officer and president of NBA Properties. In addition to his overall contributions to the revitalization of the league's image and popularity, his notable accomplishments at the NBA include the creation of NBA All-Star Weekend in 1984 along with the marketing program for USA Basketball for the 1992 Olympic Dream Team. Along with Val Ackerman, Welts was named Marketer of the Year by Brandweek in 1998 for his role in launching the WNBA. During his time at the NBA office, he supervised a wide-range of departments, including corporate sponsorship and media sales, consumer products, international business activities, media relations, community relations, team services, special events and creative services. Welts also played a prominent role in the organization of preseason games in international cities and the eventual opening of international NBA offices in Australia, Asia, Europe, Mexico and Canada. A native of Seattle, Washington, Welts began his NBA career in 1969, at the age of 16, as a ball boy with the Seattle SuperSonics. He spent 10 years with his hometown team serving a number of roles, including as the team's director of public relations during back-to-back appearances in the NBA Finals (1978 and 1979) and the SuperSonics' lone NBA Championship in 1979. In 2006, he was the recipient of the annual Splaver/ McHugh Tribute to Excellence Award, which is given annually by the NBA Public Relations Directors' Association to a current or former member of the NBA PR family who has demonstrated an outstanding level of performance and service during their NBA career.

After leaving the SuperSonics, the University of Washington product spent the following three years (1980-1982) at Bob Walsh & Associates, a sports marketing firm in the Seattle area. His non-NBA résumé also includes serving as president of Fox Sports Enterprises (1999-2000). In May of 2011, in a front page story in the New York Times, Welts became the highest ranking executive in men's professional team sports to publicly acknowledge he is gay. He was presented with a United States Tennis Association 2011 ICON Award at the US Open in New York City, an award that recognizes and celebrates those who have had a positive impact on diversity and inclusion in the sports industry and society. Also in 2011, he was honored with GLSEN's (Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network) Respect Award, which honors those who have made a difference in the areas of diversity and inclusion. In September 2014, he was honored by GLAAD, the nation's LGBT media advocacy organization, with the Davidson/Valentini Award, which is presented to an LGBT media professional who has made a significant difference in promoting equality for the LGBT community. He also served as the celebrity Grand Marshall of San Francisco's Pride Parade in 2015. In 2016 he was honored by the Anti-DefamationLeague with its Torch of Liberty Award. A member of Delta Chi fraternity while attending the University of Washington, in 2015 he was named Delta Chi of the Year by the national organization.





Kent Lacob

General Manager

Kent Lacob is in his second season as General Manager of the Santa Cruz Warriors after being named to the position on September 28, 2016. In his role, Lacob oversees all basketball operations and player personnel decisions for Santa Cruz.

Lacob orchestrated five trades across his first season to acquire guards Phil Pressey, Alex Hamilton and Jabari Brown, who were instrumental in the Warriors 31-19 record and return to the NBA G League Playoffs. In the 2017 Western Conference Semifinals against the Oklahoma City Blue, the Warriors won Game 1 at Kaiser Permanente Arena behind Brown's 36 points and five rebounds, with the team eventually falling in a hard fought, three-game series.

Prior to his promotion to general manager, Lacob served as Golden State's coordinator of basketball operations during the team's 73-win season in 2015-16. In his first season with the Warriors organization, Lacob contributed to the team's scouting department, prepared for the 2016 NBA Draft, supported analytics projects and led efforts to incorporate wearable technology.

Originally from Woodside, Calif., Lacob attended Washington University in St. Louis, where he played guard for the men's basketball team and was named captain of the Bears in his senior season. He graduated in 2015 with a degree in philosophy-neuroscience-psychology and a minor in commercial entrepreneurship.

Ryan Atkinson

Assistant General Manager

Ryan Atkinson is entering his second season as assistant general manager after serving three seasons as the team's director of basketball operations. Atkinson owns six years of NBA G League experience, including two seasons as the director of basketball operations with the 2013 NBA G League



Champion Rio Grande Valley Vipers and one seasons with the Reno Bighorns as the team's assistant video coordinator/basketball operations.

Originally from Atlanta, Georgia, Atkinson received a master's degree in sports management from the University of San Francisco and a bachelor's degree in sports management from Missouri Western State University. Atkinson began his career with the Golden State Warriors, Oakland Athletics, and Prestige Sports International sports agency.





Aaron Miles

Head Coach

Aaron Miles is in his first season as head coach of the Santa Cruz Warriors, the team's third coach since relocating to Northern California in 2012. A first-time head coach, Miles most recently served as an assistant coach at Florida Gulf Coast University, where he helped the Eagles to a 26-8 record en route to the Atlantic Sun Conference Tournament Championship and an appearance in the 2017 NCAA Tournament.

Miles, 34, first joined the Warriors organization as a training camp invitee following the 2005 NBA Draft, appearing in 19 games for a 17-15 Golden State team before his release on January 5, 2006. He received another training camp invite prior to the 2010-11 season, and was on track to make the opening night roster before his release due to injury.

Miles played two seasons in the NBA G League following his Warriors roster bids in 2006 and 2011. In his rookie season, Miles played 27 games for the Fort Worth Flyers, averaging 10.1 points and 6.6 assists while playing alongside former Warriors Kelenna Azubuike and Vonteego Cummings. In 2011 with the Reno Bighorns, Miles averaged 15.1 points, 4.1 rebounds, 8.8 assists and 2.5 steals per game over 17 contests.

Miles enjoyed a prestigious collegiate career at the University of Kansas, where he led the Jayhawks to a 110-28 record and back-to-back NCAA Tournament Final Four appearances in 2002 and 2003. The 6'1" guard started all four seasons under Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame coaches Roy Williams (2001-03) and Bill Self (2003-05), owning career averages of 8.6 points, 3.3 rebounds and 6.9 assists. Miles owns the all-time University of Kansas and Big 12 records for career assists with 954 (ninth-most in NCAA history) and is second in KU steals history with 264. A two-time Academic All Big 12 selection with a major in communications, Miles began his coaching career at KU under Self as assistant director of student-athlete development for the 2015-16 season.

Miles has an extensive international basketball résumé, most notably during a three-year stint in Russia's VTB United League, where he earned back-to-back Russian Cups in 2012-13 with BC Krasmye Krylya and the 2013 Russian Cup MVP Award. Miles also won the LNB Pro A French Basketball Championship in 2006-07 in his first international season with Élan Béarnais Pau-Lacq-Orthez. Miles also spent international seasons with Cajasol Sevilla (2007-08) in the Spanish League, as well as ACB Panionios BC (2008-09) and Aris BC (2009-10) in the Greek Basket League.

A native of Portland, Oregon, Miles resides in Scotts Valley with his wife, Mikki, and sons Aaron Jr (8), Adonis (6), Asaiah (5) and Avion (3). A lover of bowling, he once achieved a high score of 264 in his bowling league.



Michael Lee

Assistant Coach

Michael Lee is in his first season as an assistant coach with the Santa Cruz Warriors after spending two seasons as the varsity boys basketball coach at Roosevelt High School in Portland, Oregon.

Prior to joining the organization, Lee served as an assistant men's basketball coach at the University of San Francisco from 2010-13, having previously served as assistant coach at Gardner-Webb University in Boiling Springs, North Carolina. Lee began his coaching career at the University of Kansas, serving as a graduate student manager and director of player development for his alma mater's NCAA Tournament Championship season in 2007-08.

High school teammates with Santa Cruz Warriors Head Coach Aaron Miles at Jefferson High School in Northeast Portland, Lee was part of one of the best high school teams in Oregon history, leading the Democrats to an undefeated record (28-0) and the state championship in his junior season. The pair of Oregon natives went on to play for the Kansas Jayhawks from 2001-05, appearing in back-to-back NCAA Tournament Final Fours in 2002 and 2003.

A Portland native, Lee spends the off season with his family and friends. Before launching his career in coaching and youth leadership, he spent one year with the Harlem Globetrotters as an entertainer/ambassador, instructing the organization's CHEER for Character program in more than 200 U.S. cities.

Kris Weems

Assistant Coach

Kris Weems is in his first season as an assistant coach with the Santa Cruz Warriors. He is making his second stint in the Warriors organization, previously serving as player-development coach and scout for three seasons (2011-14), two of which were postseason appearances (2013 and 2014).



Most recently, Weems spent three years as director of athletics for the Menlo School in Atherton, Calif. Prior to joining the Golden State Warriors in 2011, Weems spent seven seasons as the head coach at Menlo School (2004-11), leading his teams to seven Central Coast Section postseason appearances, five league championships and three appearances in the Northern California bracket of the CIF State Championships.

Before his coaching career, Weems played four seasons for the Stanford Cardinals, leading the team to four consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances and a trip to the 1998 Final Four, earning him All-Pac 10 First Team honors his junior season. After earning his degree in sociology, Weems played one season professionally with Hapoel-Tel Aviv in Israel before returning to the Bay Area to work for Stanford's basketball and athletic department for six years.

Weems also served as a college basketball analyst for Comcast SportsNet Bay Area, providing color commentary for Pac-10 and West Coast Conference telecasts.





Long Lam

Head Athletic Trainer

Long Lam is entering his first year as Head Athletic Trainer for the Santa Cruz Warriors. Lam has athletic training experience across all areas of sportsprofessional, collegiate and high school. Prior to joining the Warriors' staff-, Lam worked with the Rio


Grande Valley Vipers for three seasons. He also worked as the head athletic trainer for the Rio Grande Valley FC Toros, a professional soccer team in the USL.

Before entering the work field, Lam completed an Athletic Training Internship with the Houston Rockets, where he assisted in all areas of athletic training. Lam served as an athletic training graduate assistant at the University of Houston for two seasons. In Houston, he also worked the 2011 NCAA Slam Dunk and 3-point contests, and the 2011 Senior Olympics for Memorial Hermann. During his undergraduate years, Lam served as a student trainer at the University of Texas-Arlington athletic department. Lam is a 2010 graduate of the University of Texas-Arlington and earned his Master's of Education in Sport and Fitness Administration from the University of Houston in 2011.

Jana Austin

Assistant Athletic Trainer

Jana Austin is in her first season as the Assistant Athletic Trainer for the Santa Cruz Warriors. Austin attended California Baptist University where she earned her undergraduate degree in Kinesiology and her Master's degree in Athletic Training. She spent five years as an intern with the Athletic Trainer for the Los Angeles Sparks WNBA team and as a mentor for



the West Coast Sports Medicine Foundation. Austin also spent time with the Los Angeles Kiss Arena Football Team and the University of California, Riverside Men's Basketball Team as the Athletic Training Intern. In May 2017, Austin went to Tanzania, Africa on a medical mission trip to help the sick and work on the water filters in the local villages.



Robb Hornett

Head Strength & Conditioning Coach

Hornett arrives to the Santa Cruz Warriors as the team's Strength and Conditioning Coach and will serve alongside Head Athletic Trainer Long Lam. Hornett joins the team after three years as Assistant Strength and Conditioning Coach for the University of Virginia, primarily serving the women's basketball team. Prior to his time in Charlottesville, Hornett

served as Head Strength and Conditioning Coach for EXOS/Air Force Special Operations, where he designed and implemented year-round training programs for over 200 elite military athletes. Hornett spent a year working at Indiana University Health Sports Performance where he created speed and agility programs, as well as trained WNBA MVP Tamika Catchings and numerous NBA players during their off seasons. Hornett also served as the Indiana Pacers Strength and Conditioning Intern from 2010-12. Hornett graduated Bachelor of Science in Sports Performance, Physical Education and Health from Marian University in Indianapolis, Indiana. Hornett is a National Strength & Conditioning Association Certified Strength & Conditioning Coach, a National Academy of Sports Medicine Performance Enhancement Specialist and is FMS Level 1 Certified for Functional Movement Screening. He and his wife, Julie, reside in Santa Cruz.

David Fatoki

Manger of Basketball Operations/ Player Development

David Fatoki is in his second season with the Santa Cruz Warriors and his first as Manager of Basketball Operations/Player Development. A Chicago native, Fatoki graduated from Washington University in St. Louis where he studied Finance. At WashU, Fatoki



played four seasons of basketball, helping his team to three Conference Championships and four NCAA D-III tournament berths. He was named an All-American his senior season. After college, Fatoki played one season of professional basketball in Spain for UCAM Murcia. He also worked for Accenture as a Management Consulting Analyst.

Luke Loucks

Two-Way Player Development Coach

Luke Loucks is in his first season as a two-way player development coach for the Warriors organization, his second year with the team after serving as a video intern for the 2016-17 NBA Champions. In this newly created role, Loucks provides specialized on court tutelage and instruction for Golden State's assignment players and two-way players Chris Boucher and Quinn Cook, as the



THE LOGO



The Santa Cruz Warriors trident logo is instantly recognizable around town as the signature image of the home team. It is the brainchild of Santa Cruz Warriors General Manager Kirk Lacob, who wanted a visual depiction that evoked the strong connection Santa Cruz residents feel with the water and the environment. The trident is an ode to Poseidon, the god of the sea in Greek mythology, and it is a symbol of power – a proper representation for warriors who take to the basketball court steps away from the Monterey Bay. In Warriors Royal Blue and California Golden Yellow, the trident serves as a visual link to the G League affiliate's NBA parent team, the Golden State Warriors, both in color scheme and its "W" shape.

The Santa Cruz Warriors play their home games at Kaiser Permanente Arena, located at 140 Front Street in Downtown Santa Cruz. It is the largest Green Certified venue in the Monterey Bay area, boasting a comprehensive recycling program, environmentally friendly cleaning practices and efficient water textures. The Green Business program calculates that Kaiser Permanente Arena saves more than 15,000 pounds of carbon dioxide and more than 82,000 gallons of water per year.


Kaiser Permanente Arena, which measures 29,928 square feet plus modular buildings housing locker rooms and public restrooms, is the largest indoor sports venue in the City of Santa Cruz. In addition to serving as the home of the Santa Cruz Warriors, Kaiser Permanente Arena hosted more than 80 outside events during the 2016-17 season, including the University of California Santa Cruz men's and women's basketball, United Way's Stuff The Bus, author events with Carli Lloyd, Ayesha Curry and Dav Pilkey, and Santa Cruz High School's graduation.





SANTA CRUZ WARRIORS HISTORY

On December 23, 2012, the Warriors tipped off the first professional basketball game in Santa Cruz history with a 93-88 victory against the Bakersfi¬eld Jam in front of a sellout crowd at Kaiser Permanente Arena. The game was a culmination of months of hard work and collaboration with the City of Santa Cruz, a partnership that began with the team's move from Bismarck, North Dakota at the end of the 2011-12 season. With one NBA G League Championship in 2014-15, three Finals appearances and the most passionate fans in the league, the Warriors enter their sixth season proud to represent the Santa Cruz community on and off the court.

On June 27, 2011, new Golden State Warriors owners Joe Lacob and Peter Guber acquired the Dakota Wizards, with the intention of moving the team from Bismarck to Santa Cruz, California. Rebranding to the Santa Cruz Warriors, The purpose of the acquisition was to turn the team into a full-service minor league system for the franchise, a move that Lacob described as, "a critical step and another plus for our organization." Operating only 80 miles south of the Golden State headquarters, the Santa Cruz Warriors provide its parent club with opportunities to develop on-and off-court talent while also celebrating its own unique identity and local community.

A vibrant and diverse community with a passionate basketball culture, the Warriors are fortunate to call Santa Cruz their home. Through the team's community outreach initiatives, the Warriors are able to partner with local schools and nonprofits, connecting with the community and creating fans for life. The team's 2,500 seat Kaiser Permanente Arena in downtown Santa Cruz is the arena the team calls home.

GET FIT

Get Fit presented by Kaiser Permanente, is a year-round community platform focusing on fitness, wellness and nutrition education to build a healthier community. The Warriors will host several events at Central Coast schools, community gathering places, and at Kaiser Permanente Arena during the second year of the team's Get Fit community program. The Warriors are partnering with Kaiser Permanente to impact over 10,000 Central Coast youth during the year, hosting events in Santa Cruz and Monterey Counties. Warriors players, along with members of the Warriors coaching staff, will join members of the team's front office, partners and media personalities to participate in events.

READ TO ACHIEVE

For the sixth consecutive season, the Santa Cruz Warriors are partnering with the Santa Cruz City School District to help develop a life-long love of reading and literacy in every elementary and middle school child in the district. In partnership with Kaiser Permanente, the nine-week Read to Achieve program encourages local school children to read nearly a billion words as a district.

Read to Achieve is the most extensive educational outreach initiative in the history of professional sports. By providing resources, the NBA continues to aid schools, libraries and community-based organizations so that children have the necessary tools to succeed in life.

COMMUNITY JERSEYS

The Santa Cruz Warriors highlight select nonprofits by literally weaving them into the fabric of the game though the "community jersey" initiative. For a select home game, the Santa Cruz Warriors jersey features the logo of a nonprofit and a corporate partner, amplifying awareness in front of 2,500 passionate basketball fans. By auctioning off the game-worn jerseys at the end of the night, the Warriors helped raise funds for Second Harvest Food Bank, Cal Giant Berry Foundation, Hospice of Santa Cruz, Homeless Garden Project and Ride A Wave during the 2016-17 season.

APTOS HIGH SCHOOL WARRIORS NORCAL INVITATIONAL

The Santa Cruz Warriors teamed up with Aptos High School to host the Aptos High School Warriors NorCal Invitational at Kaiser Permanente Arena in December, 2016. In its first year, the tournament featured eight high school teams – Aptos, Gilroy, Gunn, Milpitas, Palma, Soquel, St. Mary's (Stockton) and Watsonville, with St. Mary's capturing the inaugural championship trophy.


A three-day event, the tournament is the signature piece of the team's attempt to bring local schools and communities together during the holiday break to enjoy the game of basketball on Warriors Ground.

The Santa Cruz Warriors are committed to practices that protect the environment and preserve the Monterey Bay's natural resources. Last season, the Warriors players, coaches, front office staff and season ticket holders teamed up with the Coastal Watershed Council for a cleanup day, planting native species and cleaning up debris at the nearby San Lorenzo River. In 2015-16, the Warriors joined environmental nonpro—fit Save Our Shores to host a public cleanup event where, together with 250 fans, the volunteer group cleaned 135 pounds of trash from Seabright Beach. G League FAQ's

What is the NBA G League?

The NBA G League, formerly the NBA Development League or NBA D-League, is the NBA's official minor league, preparing players, coaches, officials, trainers and front office staff for the NBA while acting as the league's research and development laboratory.

When was the NBA G League established?

The league began play as the NBA Development League beginning with the 2001-02 season. It enters its 17th season in 2017-18 after being renamed the NBA G League.

How many teams are in the NBA G League?

There are 26 NBA G League teams for the 2017-18 season, each singly affiliated with an NBA team. They included: Agua Caliente Clippers (L.A. Clippers), Austin Spurs (San Antonio Spurs), Canton Charge (Cleveland Cavaliers), Delaware 87ers (Philadelphia 76ers), Erie BayHawks (Atlanta Hawks), Fort Wayne Mad Ants (Indiana Pacers), Grand Rapids Drive (Detroit Pistons), Greensboro Swarm (Charlotte Hornets), Iowa Wolves (Minnesota Timberwolves), Lakeland Magic (Orlando Magic), Long Island Nets (Brooklyn Nets), Maine Red Claws (Boston Celtics), Memphis Hustle(Memphis Grizzlies), Northern Arizona Suns (Phoenix Suns), Oklahoma City Blue (Oklahoma City Thunder), Raptors 905 (Toronto Raptors), Reno Bighorns (Sacramento Kings), Rio Grande Valley Vipers (Houston Rockets), Salt Lake City Stars (Utah Jazz), Santa Cruz Warriors (Golden State Warriors), Sioux Falls Skyforce (Miami Heat), South Bay Lakers (Los Angeles Lakers), Texas Legends (Dallas Mavericks), Westchester Knicks (New York Knicks), Windy City Bulls (Chicago Bulls) and Wisconsin Herd (Milwaukee Bucks).

How do NBA G League contracts work?

NBA G-League players sign standard contracts with the league, not individual teams. The standard contract is one year in duration, but players are relieved of their contract obligations if they sign a contract with an NBA team at any point during the season. Beginning in the 2017 offseason, NBA rosters expanded from 15 to 17 players with the addition of two spots for players under "Two-Way Contracts". NBA teams many have up to two players under NBA Two-Way Contracts who will spend the bulk of the season in the NBA G League and not more than 45 days with their NBA team. Two-Way players are paid a corresponding daily amount based on the number of days they play in each league. Only players with four or fewer years of NBA service are able to sign Two-Way Contracts, which can be for either one or two seasons.

How do the Golden State Warriors assign players to the NBA G League?

NBA teams can assign players within their fi¬rst three years of service to their G League affiliate. In addition, players who have more experience in the NBA can be assigned to the NBA G League with their consent. Players can stay with the NBA G League team for as long as the NBA team wishes, and be recalled back to the NBA at any time. There is no cap on how many times a player can be assigned to their NBA G League affiliate.

Who can call up a Santa Cruz Warrior to the NBA?

Since players sign a contract with the league, any NBA team can call up any NBA G League player. For example, in the 205-16 season the Cleveland Cavaliers and Memphis Grizzlies called up Seth Curry, a guard for the Santa Cruz Warriors.

What happens once a player gets called up?

An NBA team will sign a player to a contract depending on his years of service in the NBA. Typically, NBA teams will sign an NBA G League player to a 10-day contract and assess their contribution to the team during that time. A player can be signed to two 10-day contracts with an individual NBA team before that team must either sign him for the rest of the season or release him.

With call-ups and assignment players, how does a team set its roster?

An NBA G League team's roster can be fluid. There are many ways a team can acquire players: returning players, the affiliate rule, the NBA G League Draft, assignments, trades and the available player pool.

An NBA G League team's roster must be 10 players, with up to 2 additional spots for players placed on the inactive/ injury list. If its NBA parent assigns players, the team's active roster may be expanded to 13. Once the season starts, teams are limited to 14 roster moves each year. There are exemptions to that limit if a team loses a player to a buyout, call-up, or season-ending injury.

How does a player return to the NBA D-League?

An NBA D-League team has returning player rights on any players on its roster for two consecutive seasons.

What is the affiliate rule?

An "affiliate player" is claimed by an NBA G League team via the affiliate rule. When a player goes to NBA training camp and is waived, the NBA team's G League affiliate can select up to three players whose rights are not owned by another NBA G League team.

What does it mean when a player is "waived"?

When a player is waived in the NBA G League, the team has given up their rights to him. After 48 hours, he clears waivers and any team can claim him from the available player pool.

What is the NBA D-League Showcase?

The NBA G League Showcase is the NBA G League's annual in-season scouting event, when all of its teams converge in one city to play in front of NBA general managers and player personnel executives from all 30 NBA teams. The 2017 event – January 18-22 in Mississauga, Ontario – marked the 13th Showcase. Showcase traditionally coincides with the time when the NBA teams can begin signing players to 10-day contracts, since the majority of the players signed to 10-day contracts are GATORADE Call-Ups from the NBA G League.

How do 10-day contracts work?

Each season, from early January to early April, NBA teams can sign free agents to 10-day contracts. A player can be signed to a maximum of two consecutive 10-day contracts before a team must either sign him for the remainder of the season or release him.

<u>Is there an NBA G League All-Star Game?</u>

Yes. The NBA G League All-Star Game is scheduled for February 16-17 in Los Angeles, CA in conjunction with NBA All-Star activities.

How do playoffs in the NBA G League work?

The top eight teams in the NBA G League qualify for the playoffs. Seeding is based on record. However, the three division winners select their opponent, with the team with the best record picking first from the pool of seeds five through eight.

The playoffs are made up of three best-of-three series. The top seed plays away for the first game, and the remaining two games (if needed) are played at home. There is no re-seeding in the NBA G League.
