Sacraments & Celebrations New priests ordained, church buildings blessed

The closing weeks of 2005 were blessed with celebrations around the diocese. On the evening of Oct. 28 at St. Andrew's, Fort Worth, Bishop Iker ordained Deacon Taylor Marshall to the priesthood. Fr. Marshall serves St. Andrew's as youth minister.

On the following morning, the Bishop ordained Deacon Mark Stockstill to the priesthood at St. Luke's, Stephenville. Fr. Stockstill serves as diocesan missioner to two congregations: Trinity in Dublin, and St. Matthew's in Comanche. He asked to be ordained at St. Luke's because it is the parish his mother attended during her college years and thus was responsible for bringing his whole family into the Episcopal Church.

On Sunday, Nov. 20, Fr. Jonathan Ogujiofor and the people of St. Simon's, Fort Worth, welcomed Bishop Iker to their new parish hall for blessing and dedication of the rooms and furnishings. The church now has a full kitchen and plenty of room for all parish activities under one roof.

Sunday, Dec. 4, was the date appointed for the congregation of St. Philip's, Arlington, to move into its new church building at 4990 New York Avenue, south of Interstate 20. Fr. Felix Akinkugbe opened the church doors to Bishop Iker when, foll owing ancient tradition, he knocked three times with his crosier.

Deacons lead hurricane outreach projects

Two mission trips to storm-ravaged Mississippi communities



Many in the Diocese of Fort Worth have close ties to churches damaged or destroyed in Hurri cane Katrina. In particular, the hearts of St. Peter & St. Paul, Arlington, went out to their former rector, Fr. Chris Colby, and his congregation in Pass Christian, Miss. Not long after the storm, the Arlington congregation began organizing and collecting supplies for a mission trip to Pass Christian. At the same

time All Saints', Fort Worth, found it had a bond with Church of the Redeemer, Biloxi, Miss., through Deacon Ann Richards, who was raised there married her husband, Ben, there, then watched as her children grew up in the parish, too. The Richards were instrumental in rebuilding Redeemer after Hurricane Camille in 1969, and All Saints' was ready to help them offer comfort and encouragement again this fall. The following are accounts of those two mission trips.

St. Pe ter & St. Paul, Arlington, mission to Trinity Church, Pass Christian, Miss. by Deacon Lana Farley

Five volunteers responded to Fr. Hightower's call for a team to go to Pass Christian in early October. My husband, Roy, and I were joined by Cheryl Rives, Dave Hunter, and Hank Bollman, a friend of Dave's. The congregation supplied us with two wheel barrows, four chain saws, fuel, and an assortment of household items for Fr. Chris's secretary, who lost everything.

When we arrived, we found RVs and tents set up around the Coast Episcopal School, which was also headquarters for the Episcopal and Lutheran relief agencies. Under one large tent were toiletries, clothes, tools, toys and other items, all there for the taking. Another tent served as a medical clinic staffed by volunteer doctors and nurses. Yet another tent offered building materials. All of this was provided by the church relief agencies. A FEMA feeding station near the church served meals to 1,200 residents and volunteers every day.

Once we were settled, Fr. Chris showed us around the church property. The 40-foot storm surge had carried away the education and office buildings, leaving only the foundations and subflooring. The church had lost most of its subflooring and side walls, but it still had its supporting beams and roof. Some how the pews, grand piano, altar, and furnishings had been carried out the front without knocking out the beams.

Fr. Chris asked us to clean up broken glass, tree limbs, and other debris, to remove part of a boat dock that had come to rest in the church offices, and the keel of a sailboat imbedded in the yard. He also wanted a temporary floor in the nave so that services could be held there again.

Dave, Cheryl, and Hank took the dock apart and stacked the lumber. The men cut up a lot of fallen trees, except for one huge tree, which we named Goliath. We tried to pull the boat keel out of the ground with our truck, but could not even budge it, so we turned our problem over to God

in prayer. Within a couple of hours, along came two volunteers from Desdin, Fla., looking for ways to help. They just happened to have a Bobcat loader on a trailer a few blocks away, so they brought it back and went to work on the keel. About four hours later, they pulled it out. It was buried six feet deep and weighed about two tons.

Cheryl and I cleared away 30 wheel barrow loads of glass, roofing material, and broken sheet rock from the church grounds. The glass was deceptive. You would pick up what you thought was just a small piece, and it would be a shard six or eight inches long, just stuck in the ground.

In the nave, we found that several of the floor joists needed to be replaced, so we scavenged good ones from the other buildings. Then our second miracle arrived: 30 volunteers who came for the weekend with Campus Crusade for Christ were offered to us. Those kids were amazing; they were there to work, and work they did.

The absolute devastation of the whole area was truly overwhelming, and I was brought to tears many times in our few days there. However, some of those were tears of joy – joy at seeing so many people, from so many places, pitching in and working to restore this place. They were icons of hope to those who lost so much.

All Saints', Fort Worth, mission to Church of the Redeemer, Biloxi, Miss. by Deacon Ann Richards

With full hearts we offer thanks to our mission-minded parish and diocese for embracing the commitment of our baptismal covenant to "seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves."

Our former parish of many years, Church of the Redeemer in Biloxi, was completely destroyed by Hurricane Katrina, and 10 of its families were left with nothing but their lives. In response, the Mission/Outreach Committee of All Saints', under the direction of Frs. Christopher Jambor and Christopher Culpepper, developed a plan to send muchneeded supplies to Biloxi.

A list of items needed was obtained from Fr. Harold Roberts, the rector of Redeemer, and an appeal was published to the people of All Saints'. On Dec. 1, we loaded our pick-up truck, a van, and a rented trailer with vacuums, dishes, coffee pots, small grills, mixers, pots and pans, The Celtic cross and historic marker were left standing at the front entrance to Church of the Redeemer. and even lawn mowers. My husband, Ben, and I were a merry little caravan of two, representing all of us Christians, going out to "love and serve the Lord."

The items were received in Biloxi with such joy, excitement, and tears that it caused the church secretary to shout, "Oh, my God!" And she was right, of course. There is no greater love, and He tells us also that "as you did it to one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me."

On Sunday, Dec. 4, we worshiped together in an elementary school, and I had the privilege of serving as Deacon at worship. Suddenly I realized that, together with the rector and about 150 parishioners, we were the Church of the Redeemer. We are the Body of Christ, the one, holy, and apostolic church. At Baptism we are received into the household of God, and we become the Body of Christ, the Church. God will raise his Temple of Praise and worship again in Biloxi; I saw that in the faces and hearts of my fell ow Christians, the Church, the body of Christ, that day.

We are thankful to those who sent us, for hearts that are so mission-minded and so generous, all in the name of an awesome God.

Each congregation is represented by a hand-painted shield, and names are inscribed by a professional calligrapher. Preferably, names are added soon after death, but there is no time limit. For each name added, a contribution of at least \$15 is asked; the accumulated funds are used for the education of our seminarians. To have a name added to the *Book of Remembrance*, call the diocesan office at 817-244-2885. Additions are published annually in the *Forward*.
