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SUMMARY

Grenada is a constitutional monarchy and parliamentary democracy with no local government. The constitution does not make any general provision for local government; however, it states there should be a local government council on Carriacou and Petite Martinique. Whilst the Carriacou and Petite Martinique County Council Act 1995 has yet to be implemented, plans to establish a county council there are at an advanced stage.

1. CENTRAL GOVERNMENT

Grenada is a constitutional monarchy and parliamentary democracy.^{15,1a} The head of state is HM Queen Elizabeth II represented by a governor-general. The governor-general appoints the prime minister, usually the leader of the majority party, and a cabinet on the advice of the prime minister. The parliament is bicameral, comprising a house of representatives and a senate. The house of representatives has 15 members directly elected by universal suffrage, each serving a five-year term. The senate has 13 members appointed by the governorgeneral, ten in consultation with the prime minister and three in consultation with the leader of the opposition. Following the 2018 national election, 46.7% (7/15) of representatives were women, up from 33.3% (5/15) in 2013. 15.4% (2/13) of senators were women.15.1b

2. LEGAL BASIS FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT

2.1 Constitutional provisions

There is no general constitutional provision^{15,2a} for local government; however Section 107 of the constitution does state 'that there shall be a council for Carriacou and Petite Martinique which shall be the principal organ of local government'.

2.3 Proposed legislative changes

Whilst a constitutional referendum in 2015 failed to get the popular endorsement, there continues to be an active proposal to allow for local government in Carriacou and Petite Martinique.

2.4 National urban policy

No information is available.

3. STRUCTURE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT

3.1 Local government within the state

There is no local government in Grenada. However, the government is looking at how it can fulfil the constitutional rights of the people of Carriacou and Petite Martinique by setti ng up a council.

3.2 Ministerial oversight

There is no ministry with oversight responsibility for local government; however, there is a Ministry of Carriacou and Petite Martinique Affairs. 15.3b
